What is TRIO?

TRIO includes seven programs targeted to serve disadvantaged Americans: low income individuals, first generation college students, disabled persons, and disconnected individuals as they progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs.

TRIO is a commitment that has its foundation in the Civil Rights Movement and the War on Poverty with its inception in 1965. The TRIO programs were the first national college access and success programs to address the serious social and cultural barriers that low-income communities face

Each year, nearly one million Americans are served nationwide by 2,800 TRIO programs.

History of TRIO Programs

Our nation has asserted a commitment to providing educational opportunity for all Americans regardless of race, ethnic background, or economic circumstance. In support of this commitment, through the Higher Education Act of 1965, Congress established the TRIO programs to help low-income Americans enter college, graduate, and move on to participate more fully in America's economic and social life. Congress man- dated that two-thirds of the participants served be from low-income backgrounds where neither parent completed a Baccalaureate degree.

The Higher Education Act of 2008 and the reauthorization in 2010 further broadened the definition of eligibility for TRIO services to include: homeless and foster care youth, disabled people, those with limited English proficiency and other disconnected individuals. The reauthorization of 2010 also provided further clarification to the terms, Veteran's eligibility, eligible participants; and more importantly, it prohibited enforcing "absolute priority" or "control groups" for evaluation of the TRIO Programs.

TRIO programs are mandated to provide the mentoring/advising support needed to help students overcome academic, class, social and cultural barriers to higher education.

TRIO services ensure that educational opportunity remains available to all students in an increasingly competitive global economy and world.

TRIO Programs–Provide academic tutoring, personal counseling, mentoring, financial guidance, and other supports necessary to promote college access, retention, and graduation.

Jesse Herrera is a reflection of his values as a kind, resilient, empathetic, first generation Latino man of integrity. As an alumnus of the **Colorado State Upward Bound** program, graduating in 2000 from Roosevelt High School in Johnstown, Colorado, Jesse has readily shared with me the impact that Upward Bound has on his life. He finished high school, and with the support of Upward Bound, was

able to find an undergraduate home at Colorado College in Colorado Springs, CO. Following his undergraduate experience, Jesse came back to Fort Collins to work for the Upward Bound Summer Program as both a teacher and a residence hall counselor. For those of us that run summer programs, we can have admiration for someone that would take both roles on at the same time. He then decided to take some time experiencing the world through the lens of the Peace Corps and worked to improve the educational system in a local province in South Africa for two years. Following his Peace Corps service, he came back to Upward Bound and worked once again as a Summer Program Counselor. He has since earned his Master's degree in Student Affairs Administration while influencing equity and inclusion initiatives at South Dakota State University and the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. Once again, he came back to Upward Bound two years ago, asking if he and I could connect in a mentorship around leadership, higher education, and equity. Currently, Jesse serves as the Director of the Center for Inclusion at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, where he works to make the university a more welcoming and affirming place for all students, staff, faculty, and community members. Throughout his story, it is hard to miss the fact that Jesse keeps coming back to Upward Bound in different ways. He is not hesitant to name how important Upward Bound has been throughout his life as a student and a professional. Jesse and I continue to strengthen our friendship and use each other for support all the time in our respective roles. Without Upward Bound, that connection would never have been created.

Alee Landeros is a non-traditional student at Colorado State University who will be graduating with her degree in Social Work this fall 2019 with over a 3.3 GPA. She has been connected with TRIO since shewas 12 years old and considers TRIO not only her home but her life. It has been a long challenge for Alee throughout her time here as she battled academic and personal adversities. However, due to her strong char- acter and positive attitude she has always found a way to stay resilient. In addition, the continuous support of TRIO has strengthened her sense of belonging, network, and confidence. Today she remains dedicated to her internship while continuing to work at the front desk of our office before graduating in a few weeks. After graduation Alee will dedicate her skills and time to the social work field as a probation officer.

Legacie Stewart is part of the TRIO Upward Bound grant at Colorado State University (CSU) in Fort Collins, CO. She attended John F. With family support and Legacie's hard work, she is continuing to become a strong, independent and educated young woman. Legacie has nurtured her social and professional skills by partaking in our junior study tour in southern Colorado, a senior college visit trip to Seattle, committing to academic advising during the school year and by recently applying and getting selected to attend a STEM Trip with our program to Orlando, Florida. Legacie's academic dedication and passion has surpassed our expectations. She is selfless, driven and is confident she will be successful. When asked what her favorite part of TRIO Upward Legacie said, "Upward Bound has been an amazing gateway for me to explore many opportunities. My favorite part has been the trips, especially out of state. I've always wanted to travel more and I've been able to do that with this program. Eleysa Schofield was tentative about attending college due to a variety of personal and financial obstacles. Classified as a homeless youth early in high school, she has been fully self-supporting for as long as she can remember. Despite her fears, she decided to try her luck attending **Colorado Mountain College** in Steamboat Springs. Eleysa heard about the TRIO SSS program when she attended her student orientation event. "It felt like I was getting a massive head start on helpful resources by having the opportunity to apply for TRIO before I had even fully registered for classes!" Eleysa knew that the program would provide her with the support she would need during her academic and personal success. Eleysa's background as a first



generation and low-income student has served as motivation for her to excel socially, emotionally, and academically. She is an exceptional student and currently carries a 3.9 GPA. Eleysa is a leader within the campus community and serves as the Student Government Association's Student Body President. She speaks at new student orientations each semester and has shared that her goals are to make sure that other students know that they can feel a sense of belonging at CMC, and also that they will have the opportunity to thrive personally and academically while they attend. Eleysa is grateful to be a part of CMCs TRIO program. "I take advantage of the many resources TRIO has to offer including counseling with my Coordinator, someone who knows my personal situation and who I trust. I get help exploring financial aid as well as scholarship and transfer options and attend numerous Success Seminars. I also received the TRIO SSS Supplemental Grant. TRIO gives me unparalleled support with my academics that I wouldn't have otherwise gotten from family, friends or anywhere else. TRIO also leads me to resources and opportunities that may not be directly offered through TRIO." One of Eleysa's biggest obstacles has been deciding on what her college transfer options are and having the confidence to take the leap to attend a four-year institution, despite her financial restraints. "I've overcome this thanks to TRIO. Having the support to make decisions that are right for me and understanding how to be confident with my financial options has made all the difference." Eleysa will be graduating with honors spring 2020 and plans to transfer to a four-year institution within the state.





My name is **Chelsie McElhinney**. I am a senior psychology major at **Colorado Mesa University** in Grand Junction, Colorado. As a firstgeneration student, college life started off stressful and lonely. However, when I learned about TRIO and became a participant, the idea of finishing college seemed possible. I have stayed active in TRIO by attending workshops that are offered as well as becoming part of the office staff. The workshops that are provided are educational and have enhanced my social circle as they provide a way I can meet other participants and staff members. The variety of choices that are offered have helped me

overcome my anxiety, assisted me with how to better communicate with professors and peers, and allowed me to meeting some amazing new people. One of my favorite ser-vices TRIO provides is the one-onone tutoring/coaching. Unlike many other tutors, the coaches at TRIO care about all aspects of their mentees; they are easier to talk too, provide help with courses, and tips or strategies on how to be more successful while in college. TRIO has helped me academically by allowing me to build my confidence during many challenging semesters, I had a place to go and kind people to support me. On the first day of classes, I was positive that I would not be able to continue with college, as it was incredibly stressful, and I had no clue what I was doing. From the office staff, to the tutors and with the supportive programs offered by TRIO, college life became less threatening, and more exciting, opening the world of possibilities to me. Soon I will graduate, something I could not have imagined four years ago.

My name is **Michael Matney**, I graduated from **Colorado Mesa University** in Grand Junction, December, 2019. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the wonderful people at TRIO. Without the TRIO program I would not be where I am today. When I first started at Colorado Mesa University, I was 38 years old and could barely navi- gate a basic computer system, let alone the CMU websites. Struggling through High School with learning disabilities, and being bullied, I dropped out and got involved with drugs and alcohol. I became a bur- den to society, I was in and out of the justice system, believing I would never amount to anything. After getting my GED, I realized education was the key to breaking the cycle of addiction and mental abuse which was causing my selfdestructive behavior. CMU gave me a chance to prove I was serious about my education.



I was a first-generation student so I qualified for the TRIO program. Everyone made sure I felt welcomed and supported, if I had any questions, I did not feel like I was being talked down to or bothering anyone. They provided a mentor who volunteered to work with me and who went beyond the call of duty. They helped me proof-read my papers and made sure I understood the errors. The staff members would sometimes stay late to make sure that I could use the computer and not miss deadlines. TRIO offers many programs and workshops that continue to help me in my daily walk. One of the most helpful workshops I attended was the "How to Apply for Scholarships". This aided me in becoming a recipient of The Daniels Fund, and Saccomanno scholarships, which helped immensely. Another extremely helpful workshop was "Navigating the FASFA Website", after this workshop I never felt intimidated again while filling out the FAFSA. After graduation it was so easy to update my resume, because I had already created my resume, sophomore year, in a TRIO workshop. TRIO made college so much easier for me to understand and helped me achieve my goals. If someone is willing to put forth the effort and utilize the tools TRIO provides, they too can achieve their goals. Because I asked for help, used the programs in place, and opened myself to the opportunities available, I was able to achieve my degree.

David Avila: It is with much excitement that I announce that David will be graduating this May 2020 with his Associates of Applied Science - Bookkeeping/Accounting Degree. After graduation, he will be completing his Associates of Arts in Business and then working towards his Bachelors of Science in Business Administration followed by taking the CPA exam. David is a first-generation student who first attend- ed **Colorado Mountain College** in Fall 2016. He immediately recognized the many benefits of participating in the Student Support Services (SSS) program; in fact, it is because of David that both his younger brother and mother are also SSS participants. David has utilized SSS's tutoring services, assistance with financial aid and scholarships, assistance with degree selection, and more. Since beginning at Colorado Mountain College (CMC) then he has made steady progress, while commuting 1 hour both to and from campus and working 30 hours a week. All the while, David has been on either the Dean's List or President's List every semester with a cumulative GPA of 3.74. You may be thinking that David's success is similar to many other students. While there is truth to that, what makes David exceptional, is his success in spite of language dis-ability. The time, patience and perseverance David puts towards his studies, with the exception of anything involving numbers, is longer than your average student. If it would normally take a student 3 drafts to finish a paper, it may take David 5. His brain is wired so that his thoughts, which are clear often come out jumbled, so it's a challenge to rework any written work to express his knowledge. Many students would not strive for perfection or have given up. It was David's choice to partner with SSS that provided the sup-ports so he could show is true skills.

Hannah Hedelius looked forward to college since she was a little girl. She always knew she wanted to go, even knew what her major would be. But growing up in a small town of 1,200 people in Idaho, she knew she would have to really work for it. So she studied diligently to make good grades, played several school sports, and worked at least one part-time job at any given time to save money and have a well-rounded student application for college. Hannah quickly applied to **CMC**, TRIO Student Support Services, and also a work/study position. With her prior work experience, her grades, and her drive to reach all her dreams, she was quickly accepted by the all three. She has been an Academic Peer Coach for TRIO since fall 2018 and will finish out her Associates of Science with them before graduating May 2020 and heading to Boise State University where she will complete her



Bachelors and apply for medical school. Her dream of becoming an anesthesiologist gets a little closer every day. This story may sound like many others, even a little boring. But to be clear, Hannah is so much more. In fact, her move to Colorado was two-fold. Besides Hannah's position on campus, she has also worked numerous part-time jobs, and volunteers two days a week at the hospital in the Pre-Anesthesia Care Unit. Han- nah is also the Co-President of CMC's Phi Theta Kappa Honors Society chapter. As bright a light as Han- nah shines, she appreciates all TRIO has done for her too. Hannah has maintained a 4.0 GPA and loves the idea of learning and bettering herself. "I see the years of further education as a chance to become the smartest, strongest student and doctor I can be." Cheryl Barker is such an individual. Cheryl grew up in a home with seven kids, none of which completed high school, except for her. Poverty had always been a way of life and a harsh reality throughout most of her life, but somehow, she knew that education was a determinant of her future. Thus, her first attempt to at- tend college was as a single mother of three; unfortunately, she had to drop out in her third semester. Her dream was to return to college but never realized it would be 30 years before she was able to. During this time, Cheryl struggled with many adverse situations that kept holding her back and had no choice but to postpone her career, but like she says, "I am a survivor, and I have the power to change."



Cheryl is now a first-generation graduate with an Associate's of General Studies from **Colorado Mountain College** Rifle and is currently pursuing a Bachelor of Sociology at Colorado State University-Global. She accomplished this while working as a workstudy at the front desk, working as a Peer Academic Coach for TRIO students, and taking 14 credits, all while also maintaining a 3.9 GPA. The Phi Theta Kappa scholar is now working in a mental health crisis facility and helps those suffering from mental health issues and/or addiction and is also in the process of earning her certification as an addiction counselor. She hopes that using her story can inspire others, and this is the advice she gives to them; "Deciding to continue your education is perhaps the best

investment you can make for your future. The resources available to help you succeed like TRIO, are invaluable, so take advantage of every opportunity offered. Don't be afraid to ask for help along the way, but most of all, believe in your- self. Don't sit on the sidelines, get up, and dance! Make your dream happen. Dust yourself off and keep moving forward.

Adriana Ramírez is an alumna of the Weld County Site Office of the Colorado State University Educational Opportunity Center Project and from the Aims Community College Student Support Services Pro- gram. Adriana became an EOC adult participant while she was in jail serving a sentence related to her methamphetamine drug addiction and other convictions in 2005. Adriana had participated in a presentation conducted by our then Weld County EOC site coordinator about the importance of seeking education as a path to a different life. She immediately became excited about the possibility of going to college and with EOC staff assistance, encouragement and guidance, Adriana was accepted to Aims Community College for the following term. Unfortunately, she still had to complete her jail sentence. At her next court hearing, Adriana bravely went before the Judge and informed him of her future educational plans and admission to Aims. Impressed by what he learned of her plans and that she was ready to begin her enrollment the next term, the Judge deferred her jail sentence on the condition that she would enroll full-time at Aims while still completing other requirements related to her other convictions. This decision marked the beginning of her incredible educational and life changing journey. EOC referred her to, and she became an active participant at, the TRIO Student Support Services Program at Aims. Adriana went on to complete her Associates Degree and then transferred to the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley where she earned not only her bachelor's but also obtained a master's degree. Today, she is a Licensed Professional Counselor and a Licensed Addiction Counselor where she also supervises, supports and provides instruction to students who are going through their master's degree program and those students who are looking to be certified as counselors or working towards their degree and licensure. In her own words, "Now, I can be the support, the mentor, and cheerleader to those I work with in the same way that TRIO was for me. I am active and committed to my community. TRIO is now multigenerational in her family. Her daughter and several of her family members have utilized TRIO programs and services, and they, too, have graduated from college. She is no longer the only one in her family to have attended college. Thank you, Adriana for giving back to your community and congratulations on the person you have become.



My name is **Daniel Ruiz** and I have been served in Colorado House Districts 50 (Greeley) and 52 (FC) as well as Senate Districts 13 (Greeley) and 15 (FC). I am first generation Latino and my parents worked long hours as migrant workers when I was growing up. I am the first member in the program to obtain my Masters in Social Work and I am currently in the process of pursuing my PhD. I have always believed in the power of education, and I was unsure whether or not I would be able to pursue the aforementioned to the same extent that I am now. When I initially started my higher educational endeavors, I was considered a non-traditional student. I had a late start in the world of academia when I first enrolled in intermediate courses at **Aims Community College**. There were a lot of uncertainties given that I was not entirely acclimated to the environment. This, in conjunction with my late start, tended to fill

me with doubt. I was unsure if I would be able to undertake the work assigned to me and I feared that I would fail my courses. However, the TRIO Program came to my aid and encouraged me to succeed. The Educational Opportunity Center provided me with counseling and information on the college admissions process. This was seemed like the most daunting task to me at the time because of my inexperience with the system itself. TRIO also afforded me further support through another facet of the program called Student Support Services. Through this part of the program, I was continuously aided by staff in regards to the basic college requirements. Being able to have this type of support, even when I did not believe in myself and



started to struggle, helped me to get to where I am today. I was determined to achieve a degree where I could help people in some way. The understanding the im- portance of higher education made me the person that I am now. I finally realized that I wanted to teach academia and do research. My desire to advance in my field, and the requirement of devotion of considerable time in teaching, research, and publications.



My name is **Tanya Channel** and I am currently pursuing a master's degree in Higher Education and Student Affairs Leadership at the University of Northern Colorado (UNC). I am also, a proud alumna of TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) at **Aims Community College** in Greeley, Colorado. In 2014, I enrolled as a full-time student at Aims. I was unaware of the many barriers in higher education as a first generation, non-traditional, Latin-X, single mom of three wonderful boys. I chose to get an education for my children. I wanted my children and me to have a better quality of life and more opportunities. I had to believe that the voice inside me telling me education would change my life and it has.

My experience as a first-generation student meant that I was walking into classrooms and didn't understand or know how to navigate the college system. Basically, I didn't know how to access any of the support resources in higher education and I didn't have the money to continue my education. But I had determination and a specific goal. My goal was to provide a better life for myself and my kids. I'm thankful that I was introduced to TRIO SSS at Aims.

The TRIO program introduced me to a variety of diverse activities and support - I received academic tutoring and received intensive academic advising to help me navigate the higher education system. My TRIO SSS family tutored me through my statistics course, helped me find scholarships, assisted with creating lab reports and APA style papers. The staff provided small snacks while I worked on my homework and the brain power (snacks) were really appreciated when money was tight. In addition, the TRIO program offered me many other opportunities. I went on university campus tours, joined clubs, attended financial literacy classes, and worked on campus. I built my leadership skills by becoming club President of League of United Latin American Citizens. In 2015, I was inducted into the National Society of Leadership of Leadership and Success which is for students with a GPA of 3.0 or higher. I served on the board as Membership Chair for two years. My TRIO advisor encouraged me to get a job on campus and I landed a work study job in The Financial Aid Office until I graduated with my Associate's degree in spring 2016.

My experience with TRIO was so amazing! I remained in contact with my TRIO advisor even after I transferred to UNC to pursue my bachelor's (and now master's) degrees. I managed to balance my school, home and work life as I worked UNC as a Financial Aid Counselor for three years while also taking classes. To this day, my former TRIO advisor continues to provide support to me while I attend graduate school. I'm so happy that I was able to accomplish my goals and provide a better quality of life for myself and my kids. I appreciate all the opportunities that TRIO gave me.

Elzbieta (Elizabeth) Zalewski is on her way to fulfilling her childhood dream of obtaining a Bachelor of Science degree and becoming a registered nurse. While working multiple jobs and mothering three children as a single parent, she persisted through four years at **Pikes Peak Community College** to graduate and began the nursing program at **CSU Pueblo** in January 2018. Her dedication and hard work have paid off in the form of scholar- ships to help her move ahead on the next step of her journey. To get to this point, Elizabeth has meant and overcome significant challenges. Learning academic content in a second language has required her to plan much more time to do assignments that could otherwise be complemented in half of the time in her native language. She dealt with the fear in math by first listening to a friend who encouraged her by saying, "don't let this stop you." She then purchased Math for Dummies and studied for six months before taking the placement test. Despite a serious car accident with injuries the day before her scheduled test, she knew she had to forge ahead. The result? No developmental classes required. As a first-generation college student, she took advantage of TRIO student support services PPCC and is transferring to TRIO SSS at CSU Pueblo. Overcoming challenges is nothing new to Elizabeth. Growing up in Poland in an abusive home, she was discouraged from pursuing her dream and instead attended a technical high school and college After working in a school office for several years, she moved to the US in where she became a certified pilot instructor. In addition to assisting others to reach their fitness goals, she established her own business caring for mentally and physically challenged children along with pet-sitting residential cleaning. In the meantime, she married and had three children. The pattern of alcoholism and abuse she experienced as a child repeated itself in her marriage. Grappling with the legal system to ensure housing and protection for herself and her children has proved to be an ongoing challenge that continues today. Despite these current circumstances, she is determined to continue with school and achieve her dreams. She was motivated to begin at PPCC in 2013 by her desire to create a better life for herself and her children. Providing a good example to her children is essential: "We all sit around the table doing our homework together. My children see how important school is to me and the sacrifices I make to get good grades and keep going. We encourage each other," she said. Today, her two oldest children are students and USSC and her youngest is in high school.

Elizabeth has learned some solid lesson fromovercoming challenges on her road to achieving her dream. In her own words, her advice to her fellow students include:

Don't let fear stop you! Success begins with the first step. When I first came to campus to sign up for college, it was so overwhelming that I just walked back out. The next day, a friend came up with me and helped me apply for admission and financial aid and register for classes. Just start and ask for help.



Don't let life circumstances stop you! Your car may break down mine did.

You may not have a stable place to live. I don't. You may have children to care for. I do. You may not have a sportive spouse. I don't. You may not have money. I don't. But you can persevere. I DO.

Overcome low self-esteem! Build yourself up. I tell myself: Keep going. You can do this.

Lastly, ask for help! TRIO SSS has helped me in so many ways. My advisor, Mike Couillard, encourages me when I am frustrated and says: "Come and vent on me!" He helps me navigate the college system, apply for scholarships, and is now connecting me with CSU-Pueblo TRIO services and financial aid.

Truc is a relentlessly positive student who has continued through her education, even while taking two biology courses at once. Truc is goal oriented and lets nothing stop her from succeeding.

Crystal (Kiki) Gonzalez is not only an active member of the TRIO program at **Community College of Aurora (CCA)** but is active across campus while being an exceptional student. She has been President of the LatinX Student Alliance, State Student Advisory Council representative for CCA, a member of the Werewolves Robotics team, and a participant in the Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (LSAMP) - just to list a few of her extracurricular activities. She maintains an impressive GPA while participating in all of this and taking courses that most would consider difficult. Her participation in TRIO has helped her in this by opening doors to many of these extracurricular experiences. Her Academic Coach has worked regularly to make sure that she is on track academically, even as transfer schools change requirements and CCA changes its course catalog.
