
TRIO Programs

TRIO includes programs targeted to serve low-income individuals, first-generation students, disabled persons, and disconnected individuals as they progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs.

Purpose: To provide academic tutoring, personal counseling, mentoring, financial guidance, and other supports necessary to promote college access, retention, and graduation.

History of TRIO Programs: TRIO is a commitment that has its foundation in the Civil Rights Movement and the War on Poverty. They were the first national college access and success programs to address the serious social and cultural barriers that low-income communities face. The Higher Education Act of 2008 and reauthorization in 2010 broadened the definition of eligibility to include: homeless and foster care youth, disabled people, those with limited English proficiency, and other disconnected individuals.











