## Message from the President

#### Good Day ASPIRE!

I hope you all had a good spring semester and are as excited about the warmer weather as I am! I'm sorry that I was unable to attend your state meetings this spring. I really would have enjoyed participating and learning first hand about your state and the various projects that you are working on. I want to thank Yolie Kernes, South Dakota State President, and Derek Sporbert, North Dakota State President, for allowing me to participate via video



conference. Thank you to Ryan Ross and Michael Wade for speaking on my behalf at your respective state meetings. I would have enjoyed the opportunity to participate, mingle with colleagues and observe what is happening in your states but as you are clearly aware the ASPIRE board is still striving to restore our financial position and your confidence. Although the future of the association looks promising, I still feel we need to be financially cautious for obvious reasons.

As a region I think we have done a commendable job. Here are a few highlights!

- Currently, our regional budget is at \$37,505 and the amount in the state accounts is roughly \$59,500.
- ASPIRE is currently at 108% of our national fair share and four states have already achieved 100% or better (Utah, Montana, Wyoming and North Dakota).
- This year, 1/3 of the State Initiative grants were won by ASPIRE States. Colorado, Montana, South Dakota and North Dakota each received grants totaling \$2,950.00
- 66% of TRIO projects in the region provided APR data for the first regional data sheet. This is a first attempt and next year a sub-committee will be in place to continue this yearly project.
- LDI is undergoing some changes under the leadership of Oscar Felix, Andrea Reeve and Kathy Felker, and will prove to be a positive and memorable experience. I encourage you to allow your newest staff members and those who need to be re-energized to participate in this inexpensive yet valuable experience.
- The regional conference in Spearfish, South Dakota is shaping up to be an incredible professional development opportunity, giving you the chance to learn from your colleagues, become immersed in the local culture, and to renew your own spirit and personal commitment to yourself and others. Cody McMichael and his team are working real hard to give each and everyone one of you an experience you'll remember for years to come.



#### Message from the president continued

- The push at Policy Seminar was to ask for a \$120 million dollar increase to TRIO to rebuild the base and expand to serve students. Collins-Lincoln amendment #883 expressed a priority for TRIO in the appropriations process and 7/12 Senators in the ASPIRE region signed the amendment.
- Dawn Eckhardt coordinated the ETS Task Force to address concerns that changes in HEOA will have on Talent Search programs.

The board just wrapped up the Spring meeting and state and committee reports are posted on the web site. Please take the time to read about all the good things that have happened in the states and our region. I appreciate the time, energy and effort given by so many of you in our region to help ASPIRE, Inc be one of the finest regions in the country. Have a great summer and we'll see you in Spearfish!

### ASPIRE Development Committee By Carol Gritts

#### COE FAIR SHARE

As of May 2009, **ASPIRE achieved 108% of the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) Fair Share** for their Fiscal Year (July I, 2008 through June 30, 2009). ASPIRE was the first Region to achieve 100%. **THANKS** to all who participated in the COE Fair Share by paying an Institutional Membership, purchasing a Publication Package Subscription, and making a Personal Donation.

#### <u>ASPIRE FAIR SHARE</u>

The **FOCUS** now needs to be on **ASPIRE Fair Share**. This means paying the **ASPIRE PROJECT MEM-BERSHIP** if you have not done so. The Project Membership is only \$100 and can be paid with project funds. The information below indicates the participation level for all the states in the ASPIRE Region. The current Development Year is September 1, 2008 through August 31, 2009. It would be so wonderful to be able to report 100% participation in ASPIRE Fair Share on August 31.

PARTICIPATION TO DATE

Colorado – Of 42 Projects, 9 have paid a Project Membership (21%)

Montana – Of 29 Projects, 20 have paid a Project Membership (71%)

North Dakota – Of 17 Projects, 5 have paid a Project Membership (29%)

South Dakota – Of 14 Projects, 7 have paid a Project Membership (50%)

Utah – Of 27 Projects, 8 have paid a Project Membership (29%)

Wyoming – Of 11 Projects, 10 have paid a Project Membership (90%)

In addition, hopefully **ALL** personnel in the ASPIRE Region will consider making a Personal Donation. Although some individuals will give more, if all TRIO personnel in the Region gave \$10, \$15, \$20, or \$25, it would raise over \$5,000 for ASPIRE.



#### ASPIRE Development Committee continued

It is important that TRIO personnel support ASPIRE so that the organization can continue to provide:

- High quality professional development opportunities at the Annual ASPIRE Conference,
- Partial support of State Presidents to attend the COE Policy Seminar,
- Support for the ASPIRE Executive Board to meet twice a year to carry out ASPIRE Business. Because of the precarious financial situation which ASPIRE faced last year and this year, meetings were held via conference call. Although the Board carried on business, it was less than an ideal situation.
- Support of ASPIRE Presidents in their role of representing TRIO Programs at the Regional and National levels. Because they represent all of us in the Region, they should no longer have to reach in to their wallets to carry out their responsibilities as Presidents of the association.

#### COE INSTITUTIONAL MEMBERSHIPS

The amount of the COE Institutional Membership will increase next year. The increase may seem like a large amount. However, COE has not increased the amount for several years, and has been forced to cut staff in recent years to be able to operate and provide continued and increased services to TRIO Programs. We all know that without the efforts of COE:

- That there would be some TRIO Programs without funding,
- That Upward Bound would he held accountable for the requirements of the Absolute Priority and that 187 Upward Bound Programs would no longer have funding,
- That Prior Experience Points would not have been and would not be awarded fairly to some programs,
- That we would not have had representation with Congress and the Department of Education pertaining to legislative revisions,
- That we would not have had appropriation increases,
- That programs would only be funded for four years rather than all programs receiving five year grants, ETC., ETC., ETC.



### Time to Donate to the ASPIRE Fair Share Campaign

Support of both ASPIRE and COE by TRIO programs and personnel is essential if the organizations are going to provide services to ensure that legislation and funding continue to be in the best interest of TRIO programs, and more importantly in the best interest of the students served by TRIO Programs.

This year the Aspire Elections Committee has begun a few new processes to expand communications about leadership in the region and get folks thinking about the possibility of their serving in that capacity. First, a survey was sent to TRIO administrators, to gather input about what is already in existence in this area as well as ideas for enhancement. THANK YOU to the twenty administrators who responded! There were some great ideas not only for our committee to use, but also for other Aspire committees who work in leadership development and communication areas. The survey responses were synthesized and submitted to the Aspire Board for their review.

### LCCC SAGE TRIO Scholarship Reception

March 2009

The SSS project (SAGE TRIO) at Laramie County Community College in Cheyenne, WY, provides eligible students with grant-in-aid awards each March, which we call SAGE TRIO Scholarships. This year marked the 9<sup>th</sup> annual reception in which we honored our students for their dedication to their educational goals despite financial constraints. We awarded 63 students with \$400 scholarships.

SAGE TRIO works very closely with the LCCC Financial Aid Director, Dennis Schroeder, to ensure that our students can receive their scholarship as cash or as payment toward current semester loans. The reception is attended by students and their families and friends, as well as college administrators, Board of Trustee members, and Congressional Field Representatives for Representative Lummis and Senators Enzi and Barrasso.

This year our theme was "It Is Not Enough", to emphasize the importance of outside scholarships for the academic success of our students. We asked VIP's to listen to our students' stories and to carry these stories to their network of colleagues who make policy decisions, who serve in legislative capacities, and who are potential donors, thus encouraging donations to scholarships for first generation students. We asked families and friends to continue to provide encouragement and support to their student and to go a bit further: do the dishes once more each week or take the kids one more evening to allow the students to complete homework. And we asked our students to tell their stories to potential scholarship donors and Congressional leaders to ensure that future first generation students have the support they will need to success in college.

SAGE TRIO Director, Sher Warren, noted that TRIO was created by Congress in 1965 as part of President Lynden Baine Johnson's war on poverty, because education was and is the road out of poverty. "And here we are today, 45 years later, with students still at or near poverty, still struggling to reach their educational goals. We cannot afford to give up on the war on poverty or the dream that education is the road out of poverty. We must find ways to increase educational funding by telling our stories, effecting policy, and finding more ways to help our students reach their full academic potential."

### TRIO Programs Join to Celebrate TRIO Day By Michelle Watson

TRIO Programs from MSU-Billings and MSU-Northern, Educational Talent Search, Upward Bound, Student Support Services, Veteran's Upward Bound, and the Educational Opportunity Center joined forces with the MSU-Billings Office of Community Involvement, Fed Ex and Family Service, Inc. of Billings to host *Helping Our Neighbors in Need*.

Throughout February barrels were placed on the MSU-Billings campus, most of the local middle and high schools, the Lincoln Center, and Fed Ex locations to collect food and clothing for families in need in the Billings community. Along with the barrels, student and staff volunteers placed flyers on houses in the residential area around the MSU-Billings campus announcing that volunteers would be going door to door at a later date to collect food and clothing donations.

This activity culminated for TRIO Day on February 21<sup>st</sup> at the Alterowitz Gym at MSU-Billings. From 1-3pm some volunteers sorted food and clothing that had been collected throughout the month, some were at stationed at all of the Albertsons' locations in Billings, and some went door to door collecting additional donations. At 3pm everyone gathered outside the gymnasium and loaded a Family Service truck and a van with what seemed like a never ending amount of food and clothing donations. Volunteers wrapped up the day with refreshments, a TRIO Day Proclamation given by Jani McCall from the Mayor's office, and a special thank you from the director of Family Service, Paul Chinberg. ### FVCCTRIO/SSS Program Responds to Huge Lay-offs By Lynn Farris

The Flathead Valley in Montana has suffered huge lay-offs since December, with the county's unemployment rate rising to nearly 13%. Many of these workers qualify for the TAA (Trade Adjustment Assistance) program through the Job Service. The TAA program covers the cost of training programs including tuition, fees, and books for eligible workers. This has increased FVCC's enrollment by 20%.

In response to the remedial needs of these non-traditional aged students, most enrolling in college for the first time, FVCC and the TRIO/SSS program teamed up to offer special late-starting classes in reading, writing, and math. TRIO/SSS also offered a Transition to College course for these students.

Instructors have commented on what a pleasure it is to teach these classes. "They come to class early; they're prepared; they do their homework – and at the end of class they say 'Thank you'.!" These students are highly motivated and view college as their new job.

After completing a semester of preparatory study, these students will be ready to begin their various programs. They'll be prepared for the expectations of regular college classes and will have mapped out their academic success plans for the next two years. This has been an excellent example of the college, the community, and state agencies working together.
